- You are not so confident of its potential for publication

### Benefits of Working with Residents

- For you
  - Mentoring opportunity
  - Increasing scholarly productivity
  - Creating your research team
- For the resident
  - Learning opportunity
  - Gaining scholarly experience
  - Producing scholarly products

# Preparation Make sure You Can Answer "YES" to Each Question

- Is the project worth doing?
- Do you know what to do and how to do it?
- Can a resident present the work at a meeting?
- Can a resident publish the work in a peer-reviewed journal?

### How to Invite a Resident to the Project

1. Identify the resident and invite him/her directly

# How to Work with a Resident on the Project

- Initial meeting with resident
  - Set up the milestones with a time line
  - Determine working rules (meeting schedule; expectations; authorship)
- Determination of authorship
  - You will be the senior author (its value is equal to first authorship).
  - The resident is expected to fulfill the role of <u>first author</u>.
    - Planning, data collection, data analysis, drafting the initial article, and confirming the final draft

### Your Responsibilities

- Provide full mentorship to the resident
- Resolve any bureaucracy issues
- Solve any conflicts
- Take all responsibility incurred by the research project
